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Apologies

I was supposed to write this article in June. But I missed the Editor's email in my over brimming inbox and as I composed my grovelling email, I was reminded that apologising is hard.

I have had a lot of practice over the years: from breaking the loo as a child (long story) to all sorts of failures since.

There is of course the initial hurdle to overcome: that of accepting we need to apologise in the first place. That goes through various stages: denial ("It wasn't my fault" or, "He/She's being too sensitive"), conditional acceptance ("Yes, but it wasn't all my fault..."), actual acceptance, feeling sorry (contrition), wanting forgiveness. These steps can take an instant, a long restless night, or even years.

Then there is the apology itself.

This is how it generally goes for me. I summon my strength to make the call or go to see the wronged person. I speak my lines, carefully worked out beforehand because I am nervous and want to get the words out right. And then... there is silence. I think, Help me out here! More silence. I fill it with something less articulate than my first attempt. The other person says, "Yes, well..." and then reiterates what I got wrong or why he or she is upset (I think, I know all this...). Finally, there is a grudging acceptance of the apology or at least an acknowledgement it has been given. There is no sense of forgiveness.

I eventually realised that I was starting in the middle: jumping in with, "Sorry" before acknowledging the fault or its impact on the other person. I was also not asking the other person to accept my apology or forgive me, leaving them to work out the response and us both in an uncomfortable position.

So, what should I do? Thinking about this and trying to do better (as I said I have had a lot of practice!) the approach I'd invite you to consider with me is this. Let's start slowly: acknowledge our fault; then focus on how the wrong thing affected the other person, not on how we feel. Let's acknowledge that it upset them, hurt them, made them look foolish, cost them money, inconvenienced them - whatever cap(s) fits. Then let's allow the other person to speak. They may need to get something off their chest, or they may not, but they will want to feel this was a conversation, not a lecture. Then ask for forgiveness. Then promise to try to do better in future. Then say thank you.

As I mulled over this pattern I realised I recognised it: you will too. It is the form of confession we use week by week in church and which we will all have come across at some stage in our lives.

Check it out next time you come.
